The first ISG Master Class in France took place April 1-3, 2014 at Nice. It was organized by the ISG Francophone Chapter in collaboration with CNR Santé, the French National Reference Center for health care and autonomy at home, and supported by IGAM (L'Institut de Gérontologie des Alpes Maritimes). Earlier, from 2006 to 2012, ISG Master Classes were mainly associated with



Eindhoven (Netherlands) and Nan Kai (Taiwan).

The master class was attended by eight students from Nice, Sophia-Antipolis, Angers, Groningen and Utrecht, and taught by seven masters; from France: Alain A. Franco MD PhD (Nice), Jacques Demongeot MD PhD (Grenoble), Renaud David PhD (Nice), Gérard Cornet (Paris), from the Netherlands: Helianthe S.M.
